Please be aware that consulting with a Child Safety Officer does not change any obligation you have under legislation to report to an external authority. The Children, Youth and Families Act 2005 requires the following members of staff to report:

Teachers, the Principal, medical practitioners, nurses, registered psychologists and early childhood workers.

A step-by-step guide to making a report to Child Protection or Child FIRST

Protective concerns

You are concerned about a child because you have:

- received a disclosure from a child about abuse or neglect
- observed indicators of abuse or neglect
- been made aware of possible harm via your involvement in the community external to your professional role.

At all times remember to:

- record your observations
- follow appropriate protocols
- consult notes and records
- consult with appropriate colleagues if necessary
- consult with other support agencies if necessary
